GREENVILLE COUNTY EDUCATION PROGRAMS

All education programs are grade level adjusted and are appropriate for K-12 students and meet SC grade level standards.

STORMWATER

Covers the whole water cycle, definition of stormwater, and what can pollute our waterways. Students learn what they can do to keep our rivers, lakes and streams clean for future generations!

CONNECTING KIDS TO THE LAND

How did that apple get into your lunch box? Where does our food come from? Students learn food facts, what crops are grown in SC, agriculture basics, and how familiar food items are created. They'll learn what foods come from animals or from plants and what sustainability means to our food supply.

LET'S GET WET!

(No students will actually get wet!) Using activities from the award winning ProjectWET curriculum, students will learn about all things water through activity based interdisciplinary and interactive activities - from watersheds and water quality to human use and conservation.

LET'S GO WILD!

Students learn about wildlife with Project WILD activities. Project WILD is one of the most widely-used conservation and environmental education programs among educators of students in kindergarten through high school. Actual fur pelts and skulls and scat replicas facilitate questions and answers. Students learn about local animals with the help of educational puppets.

ALL ABOUT TREES!

Students learn about trees with Project Learning Tree activities. PLT was the first conservation and environmental education program for students in kindergarten through high school.

CONTINUING EDUCATION FOR TEACHERS



PROJECT WET / WILD / LEARNING TREE EDUCATOR WORKSHOPS

GCSWCD education staff serve as the SC State Coordinators for ProjectWET (Water Education for Teachers) and are facilitators for WILD and Learning Tree. Workshops are held for educators at all levels, formal and non-formal, on diverse environmental education topics so that those educators can reach children with objective, experiential, science-based curricula. These 6 hour workshops can be held at your school (minimum 8 teachers). Greenville County Schools will accept attendance at a workshop for CE Credits.

MINI-GRANTS FOR SCHOOL PROJECTS



The Greenville County Soil and Water Conservation District is pleased to offer 5 Mini-Grants in the amount of \$250 each for fall 2018. These grants are for conservation-related projects or education events/programs. A grant application is available at www.greenvillesoilandwater.com/ and must be returned by October 11, 2018 for consideration. These grants are offered in the fall so that schools participating in the Green Steps Schools program can fund projects.

GREEN STEPS SCHOOL MENTORING



Keep the Midlands Beautiful, Sonoco Recycling, and DHEC's Office of Solid Waste Reduction and Recycling established Green Steps Schools in 2003 as part of South Carolina's "Resource Conservation Challenge." This environmental education initiative encourages individual schools to take annual steps toward becoming more environmentally responsible.

In June 2016, 44 schools in 9 counties earned awards for nearly 200 Green Step projects. Nineteen schools are now designated certified Green Step schools for sustaining two or more model quality projects in each of three categories: conserve, protect, and restore. Twenty-one non-formal environmental educators also received recognition at the June 2016 awards ceremony for mentoring these schools.
